Chapter 20: World Disorder New and Old, 1993-2001

The Clinton administration's problems with the military interventions in Somalia, Iraq, Bosnia, Kosovo, and Haiti are not dealt with in any single, authoritative work, but David Halberstam, *War in a Time of Peace: Bush, Clinton, and the Generals* (Scribner's, 2001) comes close enough. Some of the better accounts come from the principals themselves: Gen. Wesley K. Clark, *Waging Modern War* (Public Affairs Press, 2001); Richard Haass, *Intervention: The Use of American Military Force in the Post Cold War World* (Brookings Institution, 1999); Richard Holbrooke, *To End a War* (Random House, 1998); Anthony Lake, *Six Nightmares* (Little Brown, 2000); and William Perry and Ashton Carter, *Preventive Defense* (Brookings Institution, 1999). There is a good chapter on the Clinton administration in Dale R. Herspring, *The Pentagon and the Presidency* (University Press of Kansas, 2005).
